Heritage Support Worker appointed

ON THE 1st of June 2004 John Zawadzki commenced the part time post of Heritage Support Worker at **Coalburn's One Stop Shop**. John (46) has lived on the outskirts of the village, in the Waterside area, for the past 15 years.

John has long held an interest in local history, an interest which also led him to his association with Clydesdale horses, a hobby shared with his wife Shona Harrison.

For the past ten years John has published a quarterly journal on the breed and has done considerable research on the breed's origins and development in the district of South Lanarkshire.

'It's a real privilege to be working with the archive of the late Jim Hamilton,' says John, who is looking forward to promoting the work of Coalburn's eminent local historian and making the collection more accessible to interested parties.

John's main duties during the 12 month post are to plan, co-ordinate, develop and monitor the heritage activities of the centre.

An initial task is the setting up of systems to preserve, catalogue and store the archive.

Mainly photographic in nature, this unique collection is safely based at Coalburn's **One Stop Shop**.

SIXTEEN PEOPLE attended a public meeting at the **One Stop Shop** on the evening of Monday 5th July 2004 and a new Coalburn heritage group—called **The Jim Hamilton Heritage Society of Coalburn**—was established.

A committee was formed with Peter McLeish as chairman, Betty Bell as secretary and Anna McLachlan, Kathleen Purdie, Jim Hamilton, Gilbert Dobbie, Billy Struthers and Jim MacLean as members.

The heritage support worker John Zawadzki was introduced to the meeting and he outlined the work he is carrying out.

The group agreed to hold monthly meetings at the **One Stop Shop** on the **first Wednesday** of each month at 7.30pm, commencing in September.

One Stop Shop

The One Stop Shop concept is a national initiative launched in 2000 by the Coal Industry Social Welfare Organisation.

A successful Lottery bid enabled the organisation to employ development workers to promote the work.

There are around 50 schemes at various stages of development in the UK with 7 in Scotland. The ethos is to create a facility which will be self-supporting by ensuring long term funding and developing the skills of those who will manage it.

Background

In this way it will be responsive to change in the long term. Essentially its role is to create a welcoming place which will provide variety of community facilities under one roof.

The Coalburn project has been completed in three phases. **Phase One** was a £45,000 upgrade of the premises to ensure that they were completely accessible to people with disabilities, which included a disabled lift and toilets.

Phase Two was a £550,000 renovation of the premises to make it suitable for community use.

The **final Phase** was to access £142,000 of funding to staff the facility over the next 2/3 years.

What you see today is the result of years of hard work, providing a facility which the people of Coalburn can be proud of, a facility that will be a major part in the continuing regeneration of the area.

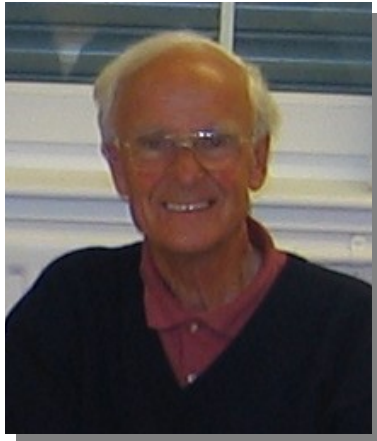

Coalburn Miners Welfare Institute

A brief history by Peter McLEISH, Chairman, Jim Hamilton Heritage Society of Coalburn

COALBURN Miners Welfare INSTITUTE was opened in 1925 at a cost of £6000. This sum only paid for the building alone. The money came from the Lanarkshire Welfare Fund, set up by a levy of one penny per ton of coal extracted locally going towards the 'social betterment of mining districts'.

This came about thanks to the Sankey commission. Ayrshire miners decided to pool their finances and purchased a mansion house and estate in the county to benefit their colleagues while the Lanarkshire miners preferred to build local institutes, of which Coalburn was the 68th. It had been thought of much earlier, in 1913, but the Great War put an end to that.

There was a delay in its opening due to lack of funds for chairs and equipment. Thanks to a strong case being submitted by the local committee a further grant of £1500 was awarded to complete the work.

The opening was performed by Mr William B. Small, the General Secretary of the Lanarkshire Mineworkers Union, in front of a large and very representative gathering including Mr Stephen Mitchell MP, Mr Gavin Hamilton, Convenor of the County, and numerous other local dignitaries.

Over the years the facilities have been well used. In addition to a billiard room there was a reading room, lending library and space for carpet bowling as well the prominent upstairs hall which could accommodate up to 600 folk.

This factor was put to the test over the years when concerts were performed by local as well as visiting artists. Film shows were a regular and popular feature, while dancing and badminton were provided by demand on a weekly basis.

The advent of television saw a drop in the number of people who were using the building and in 1959 it was decided to incorporate a social club in the downstairs area. A grant was received to carry out the necessary alterations.

Since its inception the building has been home to a number of groups, many of them still to the fore. Within this small but busy community there are up to 30 different organisations vying for support and getting it. For example, we can boast of two bands, the Pipe Band and the Silver Band, each over 100 years old.

Organisations which currently use the facilities on a regular basis include the Box and Fiddle Club, Darby and Joan Club, Coalburn Entertainers, Country and Western Club, the WRI and several local Committees, e.g. Old Folks and Gala Day, both of which are greatly dependant on support from the proprietors of the building. An active charitable society, the Miners Welfare giving generously to groups outwith as well as within the village.

COALBURN MINERS WELFARE INSTITUTE

A quote by the late Jim Hamilton.....

In the year 2000 (75 years after opening), a grant from the Coal Regeneration Fund provide money for the installation of a lift. No more is it necessary to carry the elderly and handicapped up the stairs. Even the world famous comedian, SIR HARRY LAUDER, by then an old man, had this humiliation when he appeared at a war charity concert in the upstairs hall in 1942 !

Coalburn soldier in gruelling Dutch marching test

A Coalburn soldier was among about 1200 British soldiers, airmen and cadets who had been putting their best foot forward over 100 miles in four days.

Lance Corporal Billy Muir (28) was taking part in the Nijmegen Marches, initiated in 1909 to improve the fitness of the Dutch Army.

This year the marches notched up their 88th gruelling challenge with the 44,000 entrants from 19 countries facing the problem of steady rain rather than the baking summers of recent years.

"This is my second march; we're used to this sort of thing," said Billy. "We've got a terrific set of guys, and we even held qualifiers of two 25-mile marches," explained Billy, who currently serves with 12 Transport Squadron at Rheindahlen, Germany.

Over 5,000 military marchers, who carry 20lb packs, stepped it out with a wide variety of civilians, covering about 30 miles a day around the town of Nijmegen from July 20-23.

Former Coalburn councillor dies



The people of the Coalburn area were saddened this week to hear of the death of their former long-serving councillor, Samuel 'Sam' Allan.

Sam was born and bred in the village. A lifelong Labour Party man, he originally represented the village on the old 2nd District Council before reorganisation took him into the then Lanark District Council, later renamed Clydesdale District Council.

Sam worked hard to establish and consolidate Hollandbush Golf Club as a public facility and also negotiated hard to get the people of Coalburn the best deal out of the creation of the giant Dalquhandy opencast quarry on the fringes of the village.

He was an old-time constituency councillor and was a familiar visitor to just about every club and organisation in his area. He retired over a decade ago due to failing health.

A friend and colleague of many years, former Deputy Provost Esther Serrels, commented: "Sam might have been a small man in stature but he was a big man when it came to standing up for his community"

Tribute paid to mining historian JAMES HAMILTON

A MAN who chronicled the lives of Lanarkshire's miners died earlier this month at the age of 82.

James Hamilton lived in Oak Lea, Hamilton, but was born in Coalburn into a family of miners. His father, grandfather and uncle worked down the pits.

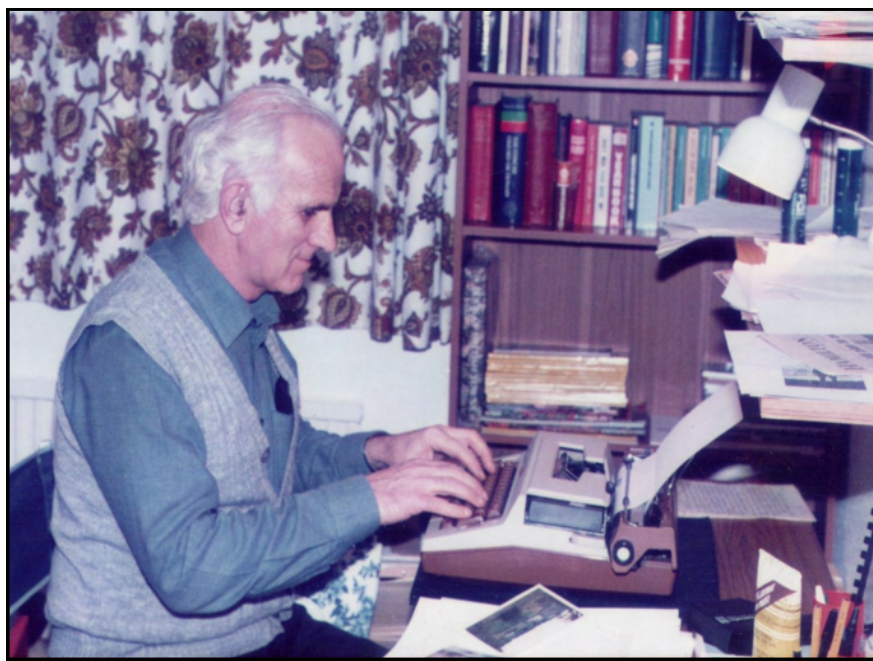
Although he didn't follow them into the job, he spent 30 years meticulously gathering material and anecdotes on Lanarkshire's mining heritage and wrote no fewer than 130 books and pamphlets on local history matters. He became proficient at shorthand and computer skills to help his historical research.

And two years ago, he received one of six awards presented each year by the British Association of Local History to people deemed to have made a major contribution to local history.

Last year, the retired social worker produced a book on the hardships experienced by miners and their families in Coalburn, Douglas, Douglas West, Glespin, Rigside, Douglas Water, Blackwood, and Kirkmuirhill.

Mr Hamilton was a former chairman of Lanarkshire Cancer Care Trust, the body who raised money for the County's Macmillan Nurses, and worked for 46 years with Lanark County Council and Strathclyde Region.

He held senior posts in child care and social work and when he retired was head of social work in the Motherwell area.

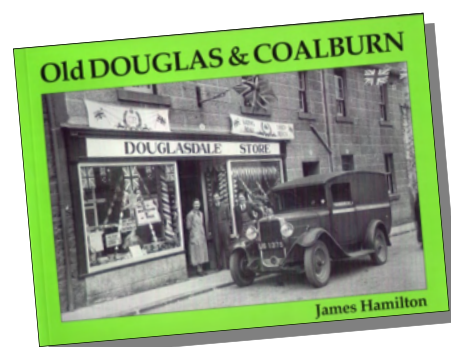
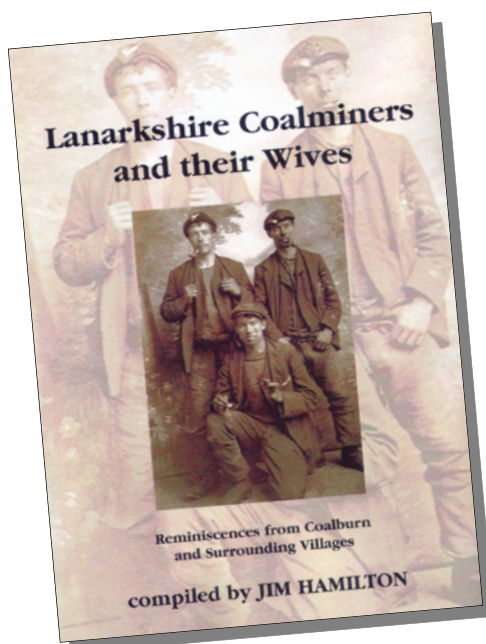


Mr Hamilton met his wife Maureen, the daughter of the station master in Coalburn, in 1948.

The couple had three grown-up children—Linda, Millar and Graham—and grandchildren

He was taken ill earlier this month and died in Hairmyres Hospital from heart failure on April 9. His funeral took place on Friday at 1.45pm at Daldowie Crematorium.

Maureen Hamilton, who survives him, said: "He was always interested in how the miners lived and worked and his last book was essentially about the miners' wives who were, in many ways, the backbone of the community. It proved to be very popular."

Obituary: JAMES HAMILTON

LOCAL historian Jim Hamilton, well known for his chronicles of the Coalburn area, his work with Lesmahagow Parish Historical Association and his recent book on Lanarkshire coalminers, died on Friday after a brief illness. He was 82.

Jim gained national respect for his work, receiving a parchment award from the British Association for Local History in 2002, but more importantly he collected memories and photographs to preserve the very human history of his area for the pleasure of the local community and future generations. Families sought out his work and carefully preserved it as the record of their own background.

Jim Hamilton was born in 1922 and made his career in social work with he local authority, being responsible for social work in Motherwell when he retired from Strathclyde Regional Council. But all his life he had been interested in local history, and retirement gave him the time to pursue that with even more dedication.

Jim's father and both grandfathers had been coalminers and jims interest in family genealogy and the history of his own village, Coalburn, led firstly to a series of 200 hundred articles in a local newspaper.

He then started producing publications preserving the memories of local families and the history of organisations, backing interviews with thorough research at New Register House in Edinburgh.

This led to publications including 80 booklets on the Coalburn Chronicles, and booklets covering Lesmahagow, Blackwood, Douglas, Rigside, Glespin and Braidwood.

Jim was also deeply into photographs, building up a large collection of old photographs, which he was happy to make available to a much wider audience, among other ways supplying them to newspapers.



Other photographs old and new were assembled into videos in a "Then and Now" series covering various villages in Clydesdale and the surrounding area, which proved overwhelmingly popular with those returning to trace their family roots.

He took his own photographs too, and built up a record first on cine film and then on video of local events such as school festivals and concerts, creating archives for the future.

Last month Jim attended the opening of the One Stop Shop in Coalburn. A heritage room is to be created there, and Jim was looking forward to having much of his material placed there where the local community could have access to it.

Jim was busy up until his death. Last year he produced an acclaimed volume of photographs and reminiscences of those involving in the mining life in Coalburn and the surrounding villages. It was called "Lanarkshire Coalminers and their Wives" as Jim had a lot of respect for the women who struggled to keep their families going on the pittance paid as wages in those days.

And with Archie Cameron of Coalburn he had embarked on his latest project interviewing on film local men who had been in the Vietnam and Korean wars, to preserve their memories for posterity.

Jim had many other interests, and for 10 years chaired the Lanarkshire Cancer Care Trust, but it will be for his compilations of local history that he will be remembered for generations to come.

"This was always part of his life," said his cousin Helen Walker this week. "He just dedicated himself to it, and it has given so much pleasure to individual families who have received records of their families."

Jim, who lived in Hamilton, leaves his wife Maureen, sons, Millar and Graham, and daughter Linda, as well as 3 grandchildren.

IN HIS OWN WORDS..... Extract from Jim Hamilton's forward in Issue 40 of the COALBURN CHRONICLES:

My aim is to make the books readable to all; my hope is that they will still be read in the years ahead. One elderly lady, whose family history I recorded in a booklet, bought 20 copies—one for each of her children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren, secure in the knowledge that her offspring will want to know specific aspects of their family history and its link with Coalburn in the generations ahead..... As I prepare Issue 40, it has been suggested to me that Coalburn now has possibly the best-documented set of family histories for any village in Britain. What I am certain is that the source of stories about the village and its inhabitants seems boundless.

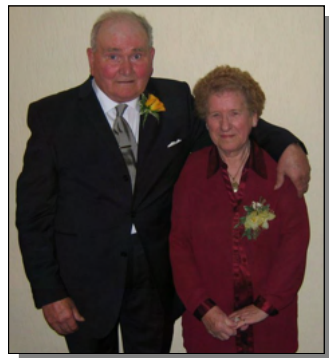
The main objective of the day was to publicise the centre and to give local organisations an opportunity to promote their services direct to the public in a relaxed and enjoyable way.

What *The People's Friend* said about Dickie McLean in 1938

WHEN the folk of Coalburn in Lanarkshire turn out to the pictures, it is almost certain they will see themselves, or someone in their families, starring on the screen !

For Coalburn has one of the most perfect pictorial records of itself and its people of any village in the country.

Many years ago, in 1880 to be exact, Mr McLean, a native of the village and a keen amateur photographer, began to put Coalburn on the screen. Now his son, Mr Richard McLean, of 14 Dunn Crescent, Coalburn, has in his possession a large collection of lantern slides, showing every phase in the village's life and growth during the last seventy years.

That the Coalburn folk appreciate the time and trouble the McLeans have taken with their living "history book" is proved by the fact that at the last public showing of the slides, there wasn't a vacant seat in the hall !

Mr McLean is still using the lantern used by his father 80 years when his lantern was the only entertainment the village had.

THE VILLAGE WHERE EVERYONE IS A STAR !

The local headmaster put into words that appreciation by referring to the 300 lantern slides as

"a pictorial record of incalculable worth in the history of our village."

"The real fun, of course, lies in the making of the slides," Mr McLean declares. "They range from the gay and comic to the natural beauties of the surrounding countryside."

Some of the earliest slides were hand-coloured before the coloured photo was even thought of.

The original colour slides as bright and colourful to-day as they were when first shown many years ago."

Every phase of village life is captured by the camera—if the folk of Coalburn want to know who played in the village band twenty years ago, who was captain of the football team in 1922, where the Sunday school picnic was held the year before the war—the answer can be found somewhere in Mr McLean's slide box.

The whole series, entitled **Coalburn 1880 to 1950**, shows the rise of the village from two small rows of simple houses to the thriving community of just under 3000—which it is today.

The picture story of a village is in demand by surrounding schools, for it is a grand—and very painless—way of learning history and geography.

The womenfolk of the village can watch a pageant of changing fashions — and even the gentlemen are surprised to find how much their appearance has changed from the days of mutton-chop whiskers and ribboned straw "bashers".

We congratulate the McLeans on providing for Coalburn a **Scrapbook of the Passing Years** which every other town and village up and down the country must envy !

Archie McLEAN 1846 - 1908

ARCHIE McLEAN gave stupendous service to Coalburn by purchasing a camera around 1880 and taking slides of local scenes and persons.

Archie died on 6 February 1908 at Coalburn at the age of 62 years. Cause of death was Pneumonia and Syncope.

Archie was a man of many talents. A fine musician, his contemporaries said he could nearly make his concertina speak. He was precentor for the Coalburn Church Choir up until 1900.

As well as having this gift for making music, Archie was an artist of local scenes.

There are thought to be three of his paintings still in the village.

The tradition of taking photographs of the village and villagers, started by Archie, was carried on by his two sons, Jimmy and Dickie.

It is unfortunate that, for a man who left Coalburn a wonderful legacy of a pictorial history of the village, there does not seem to be a worthwhile photograph of Archie McLean in existence.

Dickie McLEAN 1900 - 1990

THE DEATH of DICKIE McLEAN in 1990, just a few weeks short of his 90th birthday removed from our midst one of the best known villagers of the present century.

His recollections about the history of Coalburn were fascinating. It may be that Dickie is the last to die of the men who worked at Auchenbegg pit which closed around 1921.

Dickie claimed he was the youngest student ever to be dux at Coalburn School. His subsequent career as a coalminer was the lot of many clever lads of the generations born before the Second World War when the necessity to bring in wages to help with the rearing of the family meant their leaving school at 14 years or earlier. For Dickie there was no choice as his father had died in 1908 leaving his mother with a large family to bring up.

Dickie was active in politics and was a prominent office-holder in Coalburn Labour Party for decades. Perhaps what has given Dickie the greatest pride has been his long association with Coalburn Silver Band.



Dickie McLean was the 'big drummer' in the Coalburn Silver Band for over forty years.

"It was in 1919 that I joined the band. Ma faither had been at the starting of it in 1902. The original instruments were bought—I hope they were paid for—from the old Territorial band."

COALBURN MUTUAL IMPROVEMENT SOCIETY

The business on the programme of the association for 31 December 1894 was the magic lantern entertainment.

For this purpose, Mr Weir, Headmaster of Bellfield school, had secured the use of The People's Friend slides 'Bonnie Scotland No. 1' and Mr Archie McLean, Coalburn, kindly provided lantern and managed same.

The meeting, being open to all and young folk especially invited, was held in the church and it was completely filled.

The Rev. Mr Walker opened the proceedings and the views were beautifully exhibited by Mr McLean while Mr Weir read the descriptive matter.

To enliven the proceedings, a choir of children from Bellfield School rendered a number of pieces suitable to the pictures.

Coalburn Silver Band

COALBURN SILVER BAND became the **West of Scotland champions at the Grand Hall, Kilmarnock, Ayrshire, on Saturday 29th May.**

The band was drawn first and played a wonderful selection of pieces starting with the rousing march *Star Lake*, followed by Flugel horn player Alex Sheridan who played the Andrew Lloyd Weber favourite *I Don't Know How To Love Him*.

The deafening applause as he finished indicated just how beautifully he had played.

The band then played *Hine e Hine*, a beautiful New Zealand melody featuring the euphoniums and Flugel horn.

The band concluded with the impressive and demanding *Farindole* which ends in a fabulous crescendo.

Band members then had a long wait as the other bands took to the stage, including the Ayrshire brass band heavy weights of the first section, Dunaskin Doon and Newmilns and Galston.

Alan was again called on to lift the third place trophy as the giant-killing feat was recognised and Coalburn swept away other bands 40 places above them in the rankings. It was a truly remarkable day for the band and their conductor Gareth Bowman.

Also included in their repertoire was the traditional brass band march *Star Lake* and the wonderful New Zealand melody *Hine e Hine*. The band, conducted by Gareth Bowman, was placed 7th overall in an exceptionally competitive field of 15 bands, beating five 3rd section bands en route. A huge roar from the Coalburn supporters greeted the news of the victory and band vice-president Kevan Cairns was on stage to receive the Harry Pearce Memorial Trophy and a cheque for £100.

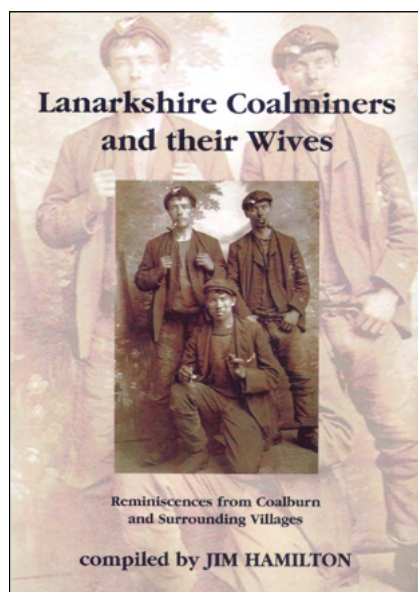
'Reminiscences from Coalburn and surrounding villages'
