“Research would seem to indicate that gala days for the children of the village started in Coalburn in 1927.

It was not until 1937 that the custom began of the selection of a gala queen by the children at the two schools, Bellfield and Coalburn on alternative years, for crowning at the gala day, traditionally held, since 1933, on the first Saturday in July.”

Saturday 3rd July 1937

“ No doubt persons of my era will remember getting dressed-up, with a ‘tinny’ affixed to one’s person by a length of white tape or string, proudly marching in the procession to the public park. There we enjoyed our bag of buns including a ‘Paris’ bun, ‘Empire’ biscuit, currant square (known to schoolboys as a ‘flies’ cemetery) and sandwiches.

We all got new ‘gutties’ to take part in the races on the gala day, and I should imagine these would cost around 2/11d the pair. ” - Jim Hamilton.

BORN at Railway Road, Coalburn on 16th April 1929, he was the only Senior Scottish Football Internationalist born in the village.

I can only assume that his father worked in the pits and the family moved to Mauchline in Ayrshire at some time, as can be seen from the following.

Archie played his football at an early age in Burns country, playing for Cumnock Academy and Ballochmyle Juveniles before turning junior.

He had originally been spotted by Aberdeen as a teenage inside forward playing for junior side Annbank United, signing for the Pittodrie club in April 1947.

His early career was interrupted by National Service, during which time he played for the British Army alongside some of the United Kingdom's best young stars. He played in Austria, Belgium and France.

One of his team mates at that time was the legendary Welshman, John Charles. Another was one of the Busby Babes, Tommy Taylor. Archie played behind him and thought he was a special talent.

Although not noted as a goalscorer, Archie Glen scored one of the most significant goals in the history of Aberdeen F.C. when he converted a penalty against Clyde in April 1955. The goal gave the Dons a 1-0 win and their first ever Scottish League Championship.

Archie made his first team debut as an inside left against Falkirk at Brockville in a 2-1 win for the Dons on 19th February 1949 but did not win a regular place until 1953-54, by which time he had been converted to left-half.

A skilful player and the master of the timely tackle, he became a member of the great half-back line of Allister, Young and Glen upon which the Championship side was built.

He also found time to fit in an Aberdeen University course and gained a B.Sc., in 1950. He later made use of his degree as managing director of a paint firm.

He went on to skipper the side and played in the 1954 and 1959 Scottish Cup Finals

receiving a runners up medal on each occasion. He had more luck in the Scottish League Cup Final, however, playing in the 2-1 win over St Mirren in the 1956 Final.

Glen was capped twice for Scotland, played six times for the Scottish League and captained Scotland "B" in his one game at this level.

His International appearances were against England and Northern Ireland in 1956. He retired at the end of the 1959-60 season after 203 League games (24 goals), 24 Scottish Cup and 42 Scottish League Cup ties (3 goals).

His brother Alec played for a number of years with Queen's Park, Dundee and Ayr United, he was also a half back. He was capped at Under-23 level. On one occasion when both brothers were in opposition while Alec was with Queen's Park, they captained their respective sides.
